

Fly by Faith

I'm not a pilot but I know that pilots of an airplane have two

methods to fly or navigate an airplane – either VFR or IFR.

VFR - Visual Flight Rules

IFR – Instrument Flight Rules

To fly with VFR means the pilot depends upon seeing (Visual) things around the plane:

other planes, the horizon, reference points on the ground, etc. Smaller, simpler planes

primarily fly with VFR and beginning pilots learn to fly *visually*.

IFR relies on instruments to fly. Radio beacons, radar, GPS, altimeters, are systems within the craft that provide the pilot data they may not be able to acquire by sight.

The weather conditions can determine which plan a pilot uses. If visibility is limited by fog or clouds or darkness, a pilot may be required to use the instruments in the plane since reference points cannot be determined visually.

I would imagine that beginning pilots who have mastered

flying visually and are learning to fly solely by instruments, go through а time of difficulty to learn to trust the instruments.

To me that would be scary! I would want to be able to see and sense where I am and what I am doing.

At first I would think that flying IFR would be "flying blindly." But really that is not true. They are not blind. They are merely using their sight

and other senses

in another way. They are *depending* on systems to guide them in takeoff, flight, and

landing. They learn *confidence* and *trust* in things they cannot perceive naturally.

Not too different from our lives. We want to see where we are going, what is around us, what others are doing, etc. But we are also people of *faith*. We depend on not knowing everything about this life journey. We cannot see all there is. We *depend* on and *trust* God for his direction. It isn't flying blindly, it is living and walking by faith.

In 2 Corinthians 5, Paul writes about our *confidence* in living in Christ. He says that even though we live in these



mortal bodies, we live knowing that when these mortal bodies are done, there is much more to come. We live in that faith.

The author of Hebrews says:

Hebrews 11:1 (NIV) ¹ Now faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see.

IFR pilots no doubt have a sureness about their hopes of a successful flight and are certain of what their instruments indicate regarding the things they cannot see. As followers of Christ we too walk with this confidence, this sureness of life. But that is because we are constantly in "flight school". We are learning our instruments of the Bible and how to interpret it for our journey. We stay in community with others on the same journey through the relationships we share in this church and in our small groups. We are in constant radio contact with God as we maintain a continuous conversation with him in prayer.

As we learn the instruments, we trust what we learn. That is submitting to him. We alter *our* course to stay on *his* course – that is called repentance. And we fly with joy and with purpose anticipating the great destination.
